"I before E, except after C" is a mnemonic rule of thumb for English spelling. If one is not sure whether a word is spelled with the digraph ei or ie, the rhyme suggests that the correct order is ie unless the preceding letter is c, in which case it is ei. For example: ie in believe, fierce, collie, die, friend ei after c in receive, ceiling, receipt, ceilidh The rule is very well known; Edward Carney calls it "this supreme, and for many people solitary, spelling rule". Perhaps the best known spelling convention in English is " I Before E, Except After C, " meaning that I comes before E in most words, except when both letters immediately follow C. Due to the simplicity of the rule and its easily remembered rhyming mnemonic, it is often one of the first rules taught to those learning English spelling.
